MR. PARNELL'S VISIT TO NEWCASTLE WEST.

Newcastle West, Friday.

A very large demonstration is expected to be held here on Sunday next in connection with Mr Parnell's visit to the town. It is anticipated that practically all West Limerick will be represented, and two special trains—one from Limerick at 11 o'clock, and the other from Tralee at 11.15—are expected to bring large contingents from Limerick, Rathkeale, Tralee, and the various stations on the way. Representatives will also be present from Charleville Parnell Leadership Committee, and other Parnellite bodies in North Cork. Mr Parnell, who will stay over night at Limerick, will arrive here by the Limerick special at 12.15, and Mr T. Harrington, M.P., and several others of his followers are expected to accompany him. Addresses from various bodies will be presented before the meeting, and the chair will be taken at 2 o'clock. A banquet to Mr Parnell will be given at the Courtney Arms Hotel in the evening. DEATH OF A NUN.

There is very widespread and deep regret at the loss the Order of Mercy in this city and county has sustained in the death of Miss Bessie Purcell, (in religion, Mother Mary Justinian), daughter of our fellow-citizen, Mr William Purcell. The deceased lady was a member of the Community at Adare, where she contracted illness whilst attending at the bedside of a suffering parishioner. It was of a very severe type, and the gentle nun succumbed to the attack and died on Saturday morning. Her whole conventual life was one long example of great devotion to the solemn and holy duties she undertook when she received the habit of her Order; and it may well be said that when the time of trial came when it was necessary even to face the risk of her life in the discharge of her obligations, she faced it fearlessly. What that risk was her death shows. She complained not to the end, and all must feel confident she won her crown and that God took her to Himself. She was 37 years of age, and had spent over half that time in her Order teaching the young and tending the sick. Her body was brought to the parent house, St Mary's Convent, and there the obsequies were solemnized in presence of her sisters in religion, and large numbers of relatives and friends. DEATH OF MR. GEORGE ARTHUR HARRIS.

We regret to announce the death of Mr George Arthur Harris, which took place at his residence Kilmallock, on Wednesday last after a brief illness. A manly and stalwart figure, his was not the least remarkable in a county noted for such, and few were better known both in our district markets in connection with the butter trade, and as Postmaster at Kilmallock for over 39 years. Latterly he retired from the more active pursuits of life, and devoted himself closely to the breeding of horses, at which he had already won for himself the distinction of being one of the most successful and enterprising breeders in Ireland. A pursuit of such vital and commercial importance to the county at large was not allowed to pass by without public recognition; and the Farmer's Club, in 1868, when the late William Bolster, Esq., was president, presented him with a valuable gold watch, showing that his efforts were, even in their infancy, thoroughly appreciated and acknowledged. Accompanying the gift was an address, which we who knew him have much pleasure in repeating, knowing how truthfully they had gauged their man—"You have, in addition to your other serious engagements, seen and acted on the necessity that existed for improving the breed of horses in these districts, and you have succeeded in introducing such sires as have, to your great credit, and to the benefit of breeders generally fulfilled the object you so worthily sought to accomplish." In conjunction with the late W. H. O'Sullivan, Esq., M.P., and others he did much to improve and extend the town of Kilmallock as well as its fairs and markets. An honest and upright friend and the recognised head of an old and respected family, his demise is deeply and deservedly regretted, and his remains, borne through the town by his sons, were followed by a large and representative cortege and over one hundred vehicles, to the family vault at Knockaney, where an impressive address was delivered by the Rev Dr Hackett.
