The bed of the river in this quarter can only be described as a series of death-traps for those unacquainted with its nature and who are not swimmers. Such places ought to be marked with notice boards as "Dangerous." We hope bathing will be altogether stopped in this quarter, and no one whatever permitted to riskhis life in such a spot. The deaths of the two soldiers ought to be sufficient warning enough in this matter.

MELANCHOLY BATHING ACCIDENT AT THE KING'S ISLAND. TWO SOLDIERS DROWNED. A melancholy bathing accident occurred yester

day morning at the King's Esland, whereby two of the men of the Black Watch Regiment Sergt Todd and Private Miller-lost their lives. Ac Todd and Private Miller—lost their lives. According to the regulations 190 men of the regiment, under command of Adjutant the Hon. A. D. Murray, went on bathing parade to the Island Point. It was not until the men were retiring from the water that their ill-fated comrades were missed. When attention was drawn to their absence, the swimming picquet, which is composed of the best swimmers of the regiment, and which always accommanies the men on such occasions, of the best swimmers of the regiment, and which always accompanies the men or such occasions, immediately proceeded to dive for the bodies, but their efforts were unsuccessful; and it was not until about three hours afterwards that the body of Private Miller was recovered, while that of his compade her not not become f his comrade has not yet been found. Both were able to swim, and it is difficult to know how were ane to swim, and it is difficult to know how they were overcome in the water, but the sup-position is that they were caught in the sand holes, many of which exist there owing to the practice of digging sand, thus rendering the place extremely dangerous to those who are not cognisant of its surroundings. Unfortunately this is not the first accident that has occurred at this place. Saveral have come how onto the death under similar circumstances. It is now high time for the authorities to take some steps to prevent the sacrifice of human life which occurs every their at this particular place, by issuing a notice call ing attention to its dangers, as well as furnish-ing life-buoys, to be used in case of emergency, A sad feature of the latest fatality is that Serg t Todd had only recently been married, and the direful news of her husband's fate awaited his wife on her arrival from Belfast this morning.
