On arriving at his house, however, it was discovered that he was quite dead.

REWARD FOR GALLANTRY.—A meeting has been held at Ballyea, Co Clare, at which Rev Sylvester Malone, P.P., presided, for the purpose of present- ing the honorary certificate on parchment of the Royal Humane Society to John Casey for having on the 8th January, 1891, rescued Terence O'Brien who was in imminent danger of drown- ing in a frozen pond at Drumquin, and whose life he gallantly saved.

DEATH OF REV. J. AMBROSE, C.C.—We regret to record the death of the Rev J. Ambrose, C.C., Fedamore, which took place on Saturday evening at Newcastle West at the residence of his family. The rev gentleman succumbed to an attack of a pulmonary character, which was of brief dura- tion. He was only five years in the ministry, and was highly esteemed by all who knew him, The funeral obsequies took place yesterday.

MILITARY.—The 2nd Battalion Black Watch, which will next month move from Belfast to the Cork District to be stationed at Limerick, came home from India in 1881, after being absent abroad from 1866. It came from Aldershot to Ireland five years ago, and was first stationed at the Curragh, then it went to Dublin, and was transferred to Belfast in relief of the 1st Batta- lion Royal West Surrey Regiment in the autumn of 1888.
