The interest which has lately been aroused in the promotion and development of cottage industries is one of the most encouraging signs of the times. DEATH OF DR M. V. BOURKE.

We announce with much regret the death of Dr M. V. Bourke, which took place at his residence, 65 George-street, to-day, from apoplexy. He had been ill but for a short time, and the news of his demise cast a gloom over the city this afternoon. A skilful practitioner, he was highly respected and esteemed, while in private life he enjoyed the acquaintance of a very large circle of friends. He had been in the profession for about forty years. Having commenced his career as apothecary of Barrington's Hospital, he subsequently became surgeon of the Hospital, and later on was appointed manager of the old Limerick Medical Hall, which position he held till the proprietors gave up business some seven or eight years ago. Dr Bourke was an amiable and courteous gentleman to all with whom he was associated in his walk of life, and his name will long be remembered with respect by the citizens of Limerick.

The weather being very favourable, about three hundred travelled from Limerick, and the stations along the route, and at Ballybunion were met on the platform by a deputation from the Tralee branch of the League, headed by their undefatigable and energetic hon secretary, Miss Rowan, and other prominent members of the St Brendon Habitation. Mr and Mrs George Hewson did everything in their power to make the *fete* a success. On the passengers alighting from the train they dispersed in knots over the sea shore, which presented an animated appearance, and the day wore on only too fast. THE SYSTEM OF COLLECTING

The Chairman said the Gabbett's notice of motion in relation to the rates.

Mr Gabbett said he was in favour of a larger Board, not for the sake of the rate but with a view to aid the Union out of its present state of affairs. He believed that the present Board was a balance of accounts of their treasurer. That was not creditable to the Union to their credit together to over £7,000. The very great importance of the Union was £196,664, and that he had brought them through into any roundabout expenditure their present position was four months to elapse before the rate to carry them forward. The time when the last rate was raised, and they had now so that any institution beyond its annual income would be a very great difficulty. His suggestions had been made with a view to their present condition. He was in favour of their treasurer. That, he believed, was a private individual or a public body. A public body would be a more honourable course to take. The Board had very wisely decided on the change of treasurer. He believed that the present treasurer was a man of interest on overdrafts, but in accordance with the Local Government Board to be paid on overdrafts.
