**THE SEED SUPPLY ACT IN NEWCASTLE WEST
UNION**—The distribution of seed potatoes com-
menced at the Workhouse at Newcastle West on
Tuesday, and was continued yesterday. Abbey-
feale division was served on Tuesday, and Caher
and Mountcollins yesterday. All arrangements
were made to make the distribution as expedi-
tious as possible, and several hundred applicants
were served each day. The clerk, master, and
poor-rate collectors and guardians of the divisions
were in attendance, and they materially assisted
in getting the work done quickly. A portion
of the supply has not yet arrived, but it is ex-
pected in the course of a few days, and the whole
supply is expected to be distributed in about
three weeks.

November 6th, 1884, the late Colonel the Hon

tate (which has been sworn of the gross value of
£19,436 5s 1d) have therefore been granted to
his nephew, the Right Hon Luke, third Baro
Annaly, of 43 Berkeley square. The testator
appoints a sum of £5,135 10s 9d India Stock to
the Hon Rupert Cecil Craven and the Hon Char-
les Eric Craven, and bequeaths £5,000 to hi
sister Ellen, the wife of Colonel Holden; £5,000
and the plate, pictures, furniture, and house-
hold effects and Park End to Evelyn Laur-
Countess of Craven; £1,000 to his cousin Ros-
Brown, £5,000 each to her sisters Charlotte an
Harriet, and other legacies. The testator di-
vised and bequeathed his residuary estate to hi
brother, Lord Annaly.
