FATAL CAR ACCIDENT IN THE CITY.

James M'Carthy, of Nelson-street, deposed that he was coming down that street at about halfpast 11 on the morning of the 3rd inst., when he saw a covered car on the left hand side advancing at a fair trot; at the same instant a child ran acrossithe street, and endeavoured to cross before the car reached her, but, evidently seeing her danger, turned back, and in doing so the wheel of the car struck her across the chest, and passed over her chest and neck; he shouted to the driver before this occurred, but in his opinion the driver could not have stopped in time; the driver pulled up imme-diately afterwards and rendered all assistance, witness helping to put the child in the car; she was then driven to Barrington's Hospital, where

William Harris, 4 Schoolhouse Lane, agreed in substance with the evidence of the preceding witness, stating that the road was fairly clear at

life was found to be extinct.

Dr Rierdan, Resident Surgeon at Barrington's Hospital, gave medical testimony as to cause of death, When admitted to the hospital life proved to be extinct; he made an external examination of the body, and found an extensive contusion on the right side of the scrip; the lower jaw was fractured on the left side; the soft parts about the elbow were contused, and there was also a fracture of one of the bones of the forearm; deceased also sustained a fracture of the base of the skull, death resulting from shock.
