

On being brought before Mr W. R. Ward, J.P. at 5 o'clock this evening, he declined to give any information as to what he was beyond stating that his name was Edward Stewart, and that he belonged to Belfast. He was remanded for eight days.

When the unfortunate countrymen heard of the man's arrest and the swindle that had been perpetrated on them, quite an animated scene was witnessed on the quay as cart after cart left off with their hungry loads.

The Hon and the Rev Kenelm Digby, uncle of Lord Digby, died on Saturday, aged 80.

A vacancy has been created in the representation of Mid-Oxfordshire by the appointment of Mr Maclean, M.P., to the Master in Lunacy.

The Rev Mr Hallows and the Rev Mr Harrison continued their open-air preaching in Arklow on Sunday. They walked up and down the street, followed, but not otherwise interfered with, by the police.

The Miranzai, a small independent warlike tribe, inhabiting the mountainous district near the Indus, bordering on Afghanistan, have risen in rebellion. A punitive force has been despatched against them.

The *Daily Chronicle* understands that the Government have officially invited Mr Michael Davitt to sit on the Labour Commission. Until Mr Davitt has replied to the invitation it would be premature to say that he had accepted it, but there is no reason to suppose that he will do otherwise.

An inquest was held on Saturday on the body of Elizabeth Richards, of Neville Crescent, Llandudno, who committed suicide on Friday, after attempting to murder John Wynne. The deceased had been in a lunatic asylum, and the jury returned a verdict of suicide while of unsound mind.

The second annual dinner of the Dublin District of the Institute of Journalists was held in the Burlington Restaurant, Dublin, on Saturday evening. Amongst the guests were the Recorder, Professor Palmer, the Presidents of the Royal Colleges of Physicians and Surgeons, Sir Howard Grubb and others.

The marriage of Prince Aribert of Anhalt and Princess Louise of Schleswig-Holstein, second daughter of Prince and Princess Christian, will take place on Monday, July 6, in St George's Chapel, Windsor Castle. The Duke and Duchess of Anhalt and Prince Aribert are expected to arrive at Windsor on Thursday, July 2.

The Credit Lyonnais have (Reuter telegraphs from Paris) received from an English insurance company, in consideration of an indemnity, securities amounting to 230,000 fr., which were stolen a month ago from the Marseilles Station. The English company was put into possession of the securities by the thieves themselves.

Mr Davitt, at Sligo, writes the *Globe*, said that he did not often speak of the Royal Irish Constabulary, but he must say they acted fairly throughout the election to both parties, and endeavoured to keep order. There was a lively scene at the special meeting of the Cork Municipal Council yesterday to make arrangements for the rebuilding of the Courthouse, an anti-Parnellite member calling a Parnellite a jackass, and the Parnellite rushing at his opponent to demand an apology till overpowered by his friends. Ultimately the anti-Parnellite withdrew and apologized for the objectionable term.
