### KILMALLOCK UNION.

The weekly meeting of the Guardians of this Union was held on Thursday, Mr Thos O'Donnell, P., in the chair.

The following was read:—

"The Rectory, Kilmallock,

"January 8th, 1891.

"Sir—I write to ask the guardians to increase my salary as chaplain to £30, as I consider the recent pittance which I receive altogether inadequate pay for the duties. It may be thought, considering the number of Church of Ireland inmates, that what I receive is quite adequate, but I think this is not a fair way to compute the amount that a chaplain should receive. The duties of a chaplain as laid down by the Local Government Board are that he should hold divine service once a week and visit the sick, but it could be just as easy for a clergyman to hold divine service for 500 as for 5. The present rate of pay which I receive only amounts to between £3 and £6 a week, and I would ask the guardians to consider my application. It was only a short time ago that I saw the pay sheet with the different officers' salaries, and I had no idea then that my salary was so out of proportion to that of other officers.—Your obedient servant,

Mr Michael Condon—It is not in proportion to the number of inmates that are in the house that the chaplains are remunerated?

Mr Coll (clerk)—Not exactly.

Mr G. Vandeleur, J.P.—The Roman Catholic chaplain has, I understand, more to do. He comes here at all hours.

Mr Prendergast, D.V.C.—The Rev Mr Hackett's salary is very small; there is no doubt about it.

Mr Hogan—How many Protestants are there in the house?

Mr Vandeleur—Five.

Mr Hogan—Does Mr Hackett attend every Sunday?

Mr Prendergast—He does, and on week days—every time he is required.

Mr Cleary—What is the Protestant chaplain's salary?

Mr Coll—£15 a year.

After some discussion, Mr Cleary gave notice of motion to have the salary increased from £15 to £25 per annum.

### ATAL ICE ACCIDENT ON LOUGH ERNE.

A very sad accident occurred at Enniskillen, in which a boy named William Gallagher, aged about 13, lost his life while skating on a small margin of ice which ran out from the lake shore. The ice was not quite so strong in the centre, and as the little fellow was almost within reach of an island he fell through the ice. The alarm was quickly given, and a number of people collected, one of whom did everything possible to save the boy's life. Some soldiers and civilians carried a boat on the ice, and smashing the ice in front of the boat succeeded in securing the body, which was brought to shore. Dr Gamble was in attendance, but the lad died from the terrible exposure. A sad feature in the case was that the mother of the boy was a witness to his death. An inquest was held in the afternoon, and a verdict of accidental drowning was returned.
