THE FALL IN LAND VALUES IN ENGLAND.

Mr E. C. Driver, the new president of the Surveyor's Institution, in the inaugural address which he delivered on Monday last, gave some tabulated averages representing the estimated reductions in the value of land in different parts of the country, derived from returns collected by the Institution of last March, from members of its provincial committees. The highest average fall is 76 per cent for the Chiltern Hills district of Oxfordshire. Next comes South-east Essex with 70 per cent, and the East and West Camb, with 60 per cent. North Essex comes out at 55 per cent, East Essex at 53, and the other divisions of the county are put at 50, as are also North and South-west Berks, South and West Suffolk, and
