SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT.—A respectable young man named Wm O'Donnell was drowned at Plassy on Thursday morning. Deceased who for some six weeks past had been a salesman in the employment of Messrs P. M. McCarthy and Son, furniture warehousemen, George street, went out to bathe with another young man, and it would appear that he got caught in the weeds and was drowned. He was a good swimmer. The body was subsequently found, and an inquest having been held by Coroner Clery, a verdict of accidental death was returned. Brown being in command. A large number of civilians were present during the inspection. The men, who presented a very smart and soldier-like appearance, got through the various evolutions in a manner highly creditable alike to themselves and to their officers. Major Gloster put the remaining four companies through other evolutions, and the battalion were then put through battalion drill under the direction of Major Gubbins and Captain, Viscount Glentworth. Afterwards the inspecting officer assembled the battalion in quarter column, turned then to the right and spoke as follows—Colonel Brown, Officers, and non-commissioned officers, and men of the 5th Battalion Royal Munster Fusiliers, it will give me very great satisfaction to make a report on the efficiency of the regiment both in camp and quarters. From what I have seen of your drill to-day I am highly pleased with it. The shooting of the battalion has been very satisfactory—the battalion has been ably supported by the sergeants composing the permanent staff, and I am proud to have such a battalion in my district—one of the most efficient I have expected this year.
