ROYAL MARRIAGE IN VIENNA.

The marriage of Prince Frederick Augustus of Saxony to the Archduchess Louise of Tuscany took place on Saturday morning in Vienna in the private chapel of the Hofburg. The procession was opened by pages in costumes of the early period of Maria Theresa's reign. Then came a number of vice-chamberlains in scarlet, and carrying white wands; they were followed by Austrian and Hungarian Cabinet Ministers, the latter in their rich Magyar costumes; after them came the great officers of State; and next Count Hunyadi, the master of the ceremonies, in a magnificent Red Hussar uniform, with a white flying jacket. Sixteen Archdukes followed in the uniforms of their respective regiments, all wearing the Order of the Golden Fleece. Then came the bridegroom, with the Emperor of Austria on his right and the King of Saxony on his left; and after these came the bride, between the Queen of Saxony and her mother, the Grand Duchess of Tuscany. Six Archduchesses and one Saxon Princess walked behind the bride. Each of these illustrious ladies wore a train of about 10 feet in length, and was escorted by her mistress of the robes. The bride wore a Court train of white moire antique, with golden bunches of roses embroidered in relief. The front of the dress was of the same material, covered with tulle illusion. The bodice was low and the bridal veil of tulle illusion was adorned with golden stars. No fairer bride (says the *Times*' correspondent) than the Archduchess Louise was ever given away by the Imperial House of Hapsburg. Tall, and of stately carriage, with a well-poised head, and large, sparkling dark eyes, she has a most winning smile; she is in her twenty-second year, and is the second child of the Grand Duke of Tuscany. The bridal procession was received at the door of the chapel by Cardinal Gruscha, the Archbishop of Vienna, who officiated throughout the marriage ceremony. The Emperor of Austria with the King and Queen of Saxony sat on thrones under a crimson canopy on the left of the altar, and the Apostolic Nuncio, Monsignor Galimberti, had a seat and faldstool apart in the nave of the chapel. As soon as the blessing had been given, the bridegroom led his bride to the dais whereon the three Sovereigns were enthroned. The pair made deep obeisances to their Majesties, and were then embraced by them. The wedding breakfast was given at two o'clock, after the bride and bridegroom had held a levee in the palace apartments which lasted nearly two hours, and at half-past three the Prince and Princess started for Prague by special train. The King and Queen of Saxony left for Dresden in the evening.
