THE SHOCKING SUICIDE OF A BRIDEGROOM.

An inquest was held at the Clough, Radcliffe, near Manchester, yesterday, on the body of Arnold Henry Warden, Manchester (artist), who was married on Monday to Miss Alice Heywood, daughter of Mr Charles Heywood, a dyer, of Manchester, and who shot himself the same evening. From the evidence it appeared the wedding festivities were being kept up at Mr Heywood's residence at Clough. About half-past ten the deceased went into the hall to bid good night to a sister-in-law, Mrs James Heywood. The latter noticed a peculiar look in his eyes. He then turned away suddenly, and went into the drawing-room, which was unoccupied at the time. He shut the door, and immediately a shot was heard. Frederick Heywood, brother-in-law, corroborated as to the strange look of the deceased just before he shot himself. Mr Henry Warden, of Rusholme, father of the deceased, said he last saw him alive on Sunday evening, and he was then in good spirits. He was impulsive and subject to violent headache. Last summer he hurt his head by a fall at Cheadle. An unstable said he was with deceased till he died. He never spoke. A relative stated he was in high spirits, and sang during the evening. The verdict was that deceased shot himself whilst insane.

SHOCKING ACCIDENT IN GLASGOW.

Two men were killed and three others badly injured by an accident in the Govan Graving Dock, Glasgow, yesterday evening. The five men were repairing the Allan Liner Peruvian, and were standing on a staging. The vessel's pro-oller, through some unexpected cause, made a revolution and upset the staging, precipitating the men to the bottom of the dock, a depth of thirty feet. Three of the men had their skulls fractured. The five men were removed to the Western Infirmary, where two of them, James McFarlane and Hugh McCrumb, died. The others are in a critical state.

QUIN DRAINAGE.—A meeting of the Quin Drainage Trustees was held on Saturday, at the offices of Mr John Loddell, C E, Ennis, to elect an engineer in place of Mr Loddell, who has been obliged to resign his position consequent on his appointment as Land Commissioner. There were present—Captain O'Callaghan, D L (chairman); W Scott, J P; Major R A Studdert, J P; Col Raham, J P; Joseph Hall, J P; A G Creagh, P; H G Studdert, J P; T G S Mahon, D L; Marcus Keane, J P; John Blood, Thomas Bowne, J P. There were applications for the office from Mr Thomas H Pilkington, and G B Milward. Major Studdert proposed Mr Pilkington, and Mr Mahon seconded him. Mr Mahon proposed Mr Milward, and Mr Creagh seconded him. On a poll being taken Mr Milward was elected, the polling being 6 to 5.

Statistics have been compiled which go to show that the consumption of butter per head in England is greatly in excess of what it is in the other European countries. The Englishman's bill for butter last year amounted to £10,000,000, exclusive of £1,000,000 spent on margarine.
