DEATH OF MR. WILLIAM HOSFORD

We regret to record the death of Mr William Hosford (senior), one of the proprietors of this journal, which took place yesterday after an illness of some weeks' duration. contracted a severe cold which developed into ha attack of the lungs, but from this he appeared to be recovering, until weak action of the heart rendered his condition very critical, and death took place yesterday afternoon at Ennis. Mr Hosford was a gentleman highly esteemed by a very large circle of friends and by whom the sad intelligence we publish this evening will be received with great regret. For many years he took an active part in the management of the Limerick Chronicle and always displayed sound judgment and business capability in all that appertained to Press work. to some years ago he mixed a good deal in public affairs. He was a constant attendant at the Limerick Poor Law Board, and was several years a member of the Corporation, and of various committees thereof, while in the City Fuel Fund he took a great interest, doing what he could through the columns of the Chronicle, and as a citizen, to bring relief to the poor when they most needed it. Some years ago he retired from an active participation in the management of this journal, and has since mostly resided in the County Clare. The funeral, which will be strictly private, will leave the Limerick Terminus to-morrow morning for the family burial place at St Munchin's churchyard.

ATTEMPTED ROBBERY FROM THE NEW BARRACKS.

An attempt at robbery from the New Barracks was made on Sunday night last, in connection with which four men named Michael Ryan, James Barrett, Wm Hanly, and James Hanly, have been arrested, and are in custody. About eight o'clock on Sunday night Constables Lee and Swan, Colooney street, were on special duty, when their attention was directed to the vicinity of the barrack. On approaching the gate, they observed a man standing on the wall, and three men on the road with a donkey and cart. The constables examined the cart and found a bag filled with brass and lead pipes, the whole being value for about £3. Having arrested the three men outside one of the constables ran round to the opposite gate to have the man intercepted who was on the wall, he having made an attempt to escape on noticing the police. The Provest Sergeant in charge turned out his men and captured the man, whose name, it is alleged, is Ryan, while in the act of scaling the wall with another bag of the lead etc. The accused were brought up at the police court yesterday morning, before Messrs Bassett, J B Irwin, R M, and F G M Kennedy and on the information of Sergeant Sherwood, were remanded for a week. It appears that some of the accused were employed by a contractor executing some work at the barrack. The constables who made the arrests deserve much credit for their prompt and clever conduct on the occasion.
