TUESDAY EVENING. JANUARY 12, 1892 THE conflagration last night, which has, we regret to say, resulted in the death of a brave man, shows how dependent Limerick is on external aid in case of fire. This has been known already, and each additional cocurrence seems to point the moral more clearly. Last night's fire arcse with cutraordinary rapidity. and before more than a few score passers-by had collected in front of the building the had collected in front of the building the huge flames issuing from the lower story were climbing half way up the front of the house, and the second story was beginning to burn. The heat at this time was so great that those standing at the opposite side of the street could hardly endure its flacconces. A corner of the beam forming the name board at Meenra Laird's had been laid hold of by the flames when the Artiller flamening arrived upon the Laird's had been laid hold of by the flames when the Artillery fleelenginearrived upon the scene, and no time was lost in securing the livested stream prevented the fire spreading to Messis Laird's. The pressure of the water from the mains appeared to be very weak; and did little more than carry the jet to the windows of the second stored, that above the shop. The Artillery fire engine was hardly employed before that of the Highlanders arrived, and both were worked with a will. Soon the steady, monotonous throbbing of the numping engine both were worked with a will. Soon the steady, monotonous throbbing of the punping engine was heard, and a vigorous and well-directed jet smasked the windows of the third storey and drenched the wills of the adjacent houses. All danger of the fire-greading on other hand seemed now removed, and to many it looked as if the fire was got under. Unfortunately before the stronger jet of water could be directed on the building the fire had succeeded in catching he d of the upper stories, and though two jets were playing on the lower parts of the burning building the upper was entirely out of the reach of assistance. A fireman named Jones, accompanied by two others, succeeded in getting to the roof of the others, succeeded in greature to brothest the neighbouring house of Mr Bourke with a hopelessly inadequate supply of water. The men were in an exceedingly dangerous position. Their lives were in imminent danger on th Their lives were in imminent danger of the topmost storey of the blasting building, which out off all retreat below. Yet the Corporation fire-escape was left standing ten yards off, where it had been standing for a couple of where it had been standing for a couple of incores, and it does not appear to have occurred to anybody that its services could have been required by any of the men in danger. Suddenly the crowd were horrified at seeing a man fall through the broken reof into the burning room below. After a few anxious moments the man appeared at the window, his clothes on fire, and finging himself through, he fell to the parement and was taken up dead. The Corporation fire-escape was still leaning gracefully against the neighbouring house, keeping the equally efficient Corporation fire-engine in countenance. Such is the story of the burning of this empty bandbox of a house and of the death of the brave man Jones, who so fearlessly sacrificed his life in the discharge of what he believed to be his duty. The public are now asking the question how many gallant lives do the Corporation wish to sacrifice before they take adequate measures many galkin lives and the adequate measures for the protection of the lives and projecty of the citizens from fire? Last night, as ever, but for the untiring efforts and skilful training of the Artillery and the Black Watch ing of the Artillery and the Black Wath Bling of the Artillery and the Black Wath Bling in George-street, and perhaps many lives ascificed that could not be spared. To the soldiers belong the credit of saving that blook from destruction, for the Corporation fire-engine and fire-escape were a ludicrous and coliseractal sham. All this has been pointed out over and over egain, but the City Fathers I will not stir a finger to remedy this uniformate state of things. It is only quite recently even that the soldiers were remunerated for the destruction of their uniforms whilst endeavouring to save the properties of the interaction of the citizens. This work should not be thrown altogether upon the military as it has been done. Whilst the citizens may always rely upon the efficiency of the soldiers every effort, should be made by the people. be made by the people themselves through their representatives, the Corporation, to have some civic organisation against the terrible ravages of fire. It is hardly to the credit of that body to know that a minute of the Committee respecting a new fire-escape lies unsigned this moment, on the minute-book after the lapse of nine months. The state of things last night as exhibited by the light of the burning building was deplorable. With the exception of the military, nobody knew what to do; everybody was sh orders, and there seemed to be a total lack of organisation. The confusion was hopeless within the cordon of soldiers who kept the crowd back and preserved an open space in front of the conflagration. There was every desire to be as useful as possible, to spare neither exertion nor (as is shown in the case of Jones life itself to get the fire under, but the result speaks for itself. With regard to the gallant fireman who lost his life, a spontaneous effort to do something for his widow and family was started in half-a-dozen quarters in the city to day. The Most Rev. Dr. O'Dwyer lost not a moment in giving the movement the impetus
