

THE PREVENTION OF CRUELTY TO CHILDREN.—The Mayor has issued invitations for a meeting to be held at the Town Hall, on Thursday next, to hear an address from Miss Johnson of the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, on the work of the society, and to consider the advisability of forming an aid committee in Limerick. The Right Rev the Lord Bishop of Limerick, is expected to attend.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—Yesterday a child named Mary Holland, aged three years, was received into Barrington's Hospital, suffering from very severe injuries received on the face and body. It appears that the mother, who resides at Pennywell, went out to a neighbour's house, leaving the child within. While absent she got into the fire somehow or other, and when the mother returned she found her dreadfully injured, as already stated. The little sufferer died at the hospital this morning.

THE SOCIETY OF FRIENDS AND THE FAMINE IN RUSSIA.—A Reuter's telegram from St. Petersburg states:—"Much satisfaction is expressed by the Russian papers, and is generally felt by the public, at the conscientious manner in which the representatives of the Society of Friends have distributed the funds contributed by the Society for the relief of the famine sufferers in Russia, and the impartiality with which they have rendered an account of their mission in the English Press." We understand the members of this small sect have themselves subscribed £100,000, in addition to what has been collected or given to them to distribute.

FIRE AT DUBLIN CASTLE.

Dublin, Saturday.
A fire broke out at four o'clock this afternoon in Dublin Castle. A mounted hussar was despatched in great haste for the fire brigade, and much excitement prevailed outside the Castle, where a large crowd of people collected. It is stated the fire broke out in the State Apartments, where the electric-light is used. With ample assistance the fire brigade quickly extinguished the flames, which broke out in the corridor leading to the State Apartments. A beam over the fireplace was ignited, and the fire was rapidly spreading when first discovered. Considerable damage was done by water and the tearing up of boards. It was fortunate the fire did not occur at night.

On Monday last, Mr M. E. Conway was the recipient of an address and testimonial at the hands of the Local Boards and Telegraph Staffs. And the District Sub-Postmasters on the occasion of his retirement from the Postmastership of Limerick.

Mr O'Keefe, on behalf of the Telegraph Staff, re-echoed the sentiments expressed by Mr Hook, and was followed by Mr Humphries, who in like terms expressed the feelings of the department represented by him.

Mr Conway, who was visibly moved, thanked each and all for the very kind things they had said about him, and for their valuable presentation, which he said he would cherish during the remainder of his life, and which would be carefully treasured by those who should follow him. THE LABOURERS' ACT.

A letter was read from the Local Government Board, stating that having referred the question of surcharges in respect of arrears which had been made against certain guardians, to the auditor, the latter saw no way to remit them. With regard to the question of remitting arrears of rent due by Mrs Fitzgibbon, the tenant of a labourer's cottage, the Local Government Board stated that no such power was vested in the Guardians unless legal obstacles existed in the way of recovery.

Mr Drury, auditor, wrote to Mr Guinane stating that he would take no further action against the Guardians who were surcharged and decreed at the County Petty Sessions until the 8th of March, according to the arrangement come in court.
