In every matter (politics apart) which required tact, skill, ability, and knowledge of the world the citizens looked up to Sir James Spaight as the one to whose care the most important negotiations might be entrusted. For many years past Sir James occupied a position which might be said to be unique. He was Chairman of the Chamber of Commerce of the Harbour Board, of the Waterford and Limerick Rail way, and probably during his long life there was no enterprise connected with the city of Limerick in which he did not take an import ant, if not the leading part. In consequence of the shifting of the political centre of gravity and the transference of political power to other directions within the last quarter of a century this eminent citizen was somewhat the political life of the city. Yet under these altered circumstances he called by his political opponents to fill the office of Mayor in the year 1877, and was the last member of the Conservative minority who tilled the post. Many years before this, and whilst a comparatively young man, he occupied ne position of High Sheriff and Mayor of this city with distinction to himself and advantage to the commercial interests of Limerick. On one occasion he was elected Parliamentry re-Building construction—student John Scaffney.

It was in the nduct of difficult negotiations requiring delicacy and tact that his peculiar qualities were seen to best advantage. He combined the suggest in mode with the fortiter in re. One could not fail to be attracted by his prepose ssing appearance, pleasing countenance, and calm impressive utterance.
