**THE FISHERY BOARD.**

A specially convened meeting of the Limerick Board of Conservators was held to-day, in the County Courthouse. There were present—Hon G Monseil, D.L., Chairman; Mr H V McNamara, V.C.; Mr G W Bassett, J.P.; Mr A Parker, J.P.; Alderman Counihan, J.P. and Captain Vansittart, junr.

The Chairman said—Before we proceed to consider the business which has brought us here to-day, I beg to submit to you a resolution which, I feel sure, will be carried unanimously. The mysterious malady which has stricken down the rich man, and the poor man, the bridegroom on the steps of the throne, and the peasant in his cabin, has taken from amongst us our companion and friend, Mr Hunt, of Inchirourke. In private life we mourn the loss of a good man, in public life the loss of a straight man. It seems to me that it was only yesterday that he stood there addressing us. Such is life, gentlemen. We may only bow our heads and say "Thy will be done." I beg to propose—"That we desire to record our heartfelt sorrow at the untimely death of our esteemed colleague, Mr Hunt, of Inchirourke. That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Mrs Hunt."

The resolution was carried unanimously. The Chairman then explained that the meeting had been convened to consider the order that had recently appeared in the *Limerick Chronicle*, directing the immediate payment of license duty. He said that by the standing orders of the Board, notice of motion was required before any matter of importance could be discussed. Notice of motion had been given. That to require immediate payment of license duty was a matter of considerable importance. That for 40 years the Board had firmly declined to collect the license duty immediately the fishing season opened. That no later than on the 1st May, 1890, a general meeting of the Board had actually extended the time for the payment of license duty by one month. That the Board had always adopted the view that so long as the license duty was collected during the course of the year, it did not matter when it was collected. That last year all the license duty had been collected—both the stake-net and drift-net licenses. That were this edict to go forth, it was the drift-net fisherman who would suffer. That it was idle to say that the poor fisherman would borrow the money. Money was not to be borrowed nowadays for nothing. That the poor fisherman who borrowed money to pay his license duty would have to pay heavy interest on the money he raised. He wound up by denouncing the order as uncalled for, reactionary, and harsh. He proposed the following resolution:—"That the order recorded on the minutes of the proceedings of the last general meeting is invalid, inasmuch as by our standing orders it required notice of motion. That our secretary be directed to inform the Inspectors of Irish Fisheries that it has been the invariable practice of the Board not to institute proceedings against persons for not paying their license duty for a short time after commencing to fish, and that no pecuniary loss was thereby occurred."

Alderman Counihan seconded the resolution. Captain Vansittart, junr, said that the law should be obeyed. If drift-net fishermen and weir owners were given time to pay their licenses why should not the rod men too be given time to pay their licenses. Besides they had lost money.

Mr Monseil said that in the case referred to by Captain Vansittart what had happened was this. The Board had prosecuted a certain weir owner. This weir owner had been condemned to pay £60, the minimum punishment for fishing without a license, being double the amount of the license duty. The Lord Lieutenant, however, had remitted both the license duty and the penalty.

Mr H. V. McNamara agreed with Mr Monseil that it would be a hardship to suddenly insist upon these licenses being immediately paid. He suggested that for next year a scheme of this sort should be devised—that a month or two months' grace should be granted, and then that the licenses should be collected. He was quite of opinion that the order was informal and required notice of motion.

Mr Parker agreed with Captain Vansittart that the law should be obeyed.

On a division there voted for the resolution—Mr H. V. McNamara, Alderman Counihan, Mr Bassett, and the Chairman.

Against—Capt Vansittart and Mr Parker. The resolution was declared carried, and the Board adjourned.
