On the affidavits before the jury there was evidence against the plaintiff on the question of personal liability. There was abundant evidence on the question of the election of the plaintiff.

Murphy, in granting the motion to adjourn, said he failed to find any ground for a jury.

ARNELL'S CIRCUMSTANCES.

The correspondent of the *Irish Times* has furnished me with the following information which I recently sent you regarding the circumstances in which Mrs Parnell, and the explanation of the action of the Bank, has attracted considerable notice. It is thought very odd that Mrs Parnell herself in financial difficulties considerable amount of money she is said to have recently under the settlement of the will of her late husband. The popular impression of the case is that Mrs Parnell, upon the death of her husband, came into property valued at £100,000.
