A partial eclipse of the moon took place last night. Nearly the entire surface of our satellite being obscured by the earth's shadow at the period of the greatest phase. The night was bright and the eclipse was clearly noticeable in the city.

SUICIDE OF A POLICE CONSTABLE.—On Sunday last Constable Crawford committed suicide at Hospital by discharging a revolver into his mouth. The deceased has been stationed in Hospital for the past three or four years. He had about fifteen years service and was married. An inquest was held, and the jury returned a verdict that deceased committed suicide while labouring under temporary insanity.

Yesterday evening Doctors Holmes, Riordan, Shanahan, Fogarty, and O'Mara had a consultation, with the result that they decided to put Cronin under an operation for the purpose of extracting the bullet. The operation was successfully performed, but the bullet being embedded in the shoulder bone, it was found necessary to excise the joint. Cronin, although progressing as favourably as could be expected, under the care of Dr Riordan, Resident Medical Superintendent, and the visiting staff, lies in a precarious condition, the doctors being unable to pronounce his life out of danger. M'Inerney's condition is also serious.
