## SINGULAR DROWNING FATALITY AT MILTOWN-MALBAY.

On Sunday evening while fishing off the rocks with a rod at Poulakirka, Clodigh, a young man named Darby Burns was washed off by a wave. He battled for some time till he gained another ledge of rock, when a second wave came, washing him into a seething surge. His body has not yet been found.

DARING BURGLARY IN THE MILITARY BARRACKS, TEMPLEMORE. On Saturday night, about half-past eleven o'clock, Lieutenant Payne, of the East Surrey Regiment, entered his quarters in the barracks at Templemore and found two burglars in possession, and his room entirely disarranged. He selzed one of the men. The other thief in attempting to escape jumped from the window, which was on the third storey, breaking his leg and arm in the leap. Lieutenant Payne relaxed his hold on the prisoner held by him and let him go, first securing his cap and shoulder-strap as a means of identification. He at once alarmed the guard, and had the injured man removed to hospital, where he now lies in a dangerous condition. The other burglar was afterwards arrested and lodged in the guardroom. A watch and an opera glass are missing. The two men concerned in the burglary are both privates in a detachment of the Royal Artillery quartered at Templemore, and have about six months service.
