**INQUEST ON LADY SANDHURST.**  
 Yesterday morning Dr G. Danford Thomas  
 an inquest on the body of Margaret Mans-

 only expired on Thursday evening at 29 Park  
 , Regent's Park.

rd Sandhurst, of 29 St James's place, S.W.,  
 that the deceased, who was his mother, was  
 widow of the late Baron Sandhurst. She

 good health. On Thursday evening he

 Hampstead, about six o'clock on Thursday  
 ing, Miss Mansfield called the witness and  
 her mother was very poorly. The deceased  
 lying on the bed in pain, and she complained  
 atulency. At her request the witness brought  
 t water bottle to her, and her ladyship asked  
 to rub her, which she did. She said she felt  
 s in the back. She had another hot water  
 le, which was placed at her side. She then  
 lenly ceased to breathe, and expired almost  
 nce. Dr Johnson, a neighbouring practitioner,  
 immediately summoned. Witness had only  
 vn her complain of indigestion occasionally.  
 r Joseph Johnson, of 24 St John's Wood  
 s, deposed that he had known the deceased  
 nately for 20 years. He had frequently  
 nded her, but not lately. She invariably had  
 good health. On being summoned at a  
 rter past seven on Thursday evening he found  
 lying dead in bed. On Friday the witness  
 ed upon the lady at Hampstead whom Lady  
 Hurst visited. The lady said the deceased  
 arrived in a very fatigued state. She had  
 ed up two rather steep hills, and she ex-  
 enced a difficulty in breathing. She, how-  
 , recovered after resting a while, and wished  
 alk home, but her friend sent her back in a  
 Witness had since made a *post mortem*  
 exation. He found all the organs of the body  
 hy. Her ladyship, however, died from  
 ope, while suffering from fatty degeneration  
 e heart. She had, however, accelerated the

**DEATH OF MR WILLIAM MALCOLMSON,  
 OF PORTLAW.**

Yesterday morning, at 2 a.m., Mr William  
 Malcolmson, of the firm of Malcolmson Brothers,  
 ship owners, ship builders, linen and cotton  
 manufacturers in Belfast, Carrick-on-Suir, and  
 Portlaw, died at his residence, Millfort, Portlaw,  
 County Waterford. For many years he held the  
 position of Chairman of the Waterford Steam-  
 shipping Company, and during his chairmanship  
 a fleet of steamers sailed from Irish and English  
 ports all over the world. He held in his time  
 the position of Chairman of the Waterford and  
 Limerick Railway. He was President of the  
 Waterford Chamber of Commerce. To his libe-  
 rality may be attributed the splendid reception  
 Earl Spencer received in Waterford on the day he  
 as Lord Lieutenant laid the first stone of a dry  
 dock. Highly esteemed as he was in commercial  
 life for his manly qualities, he was equally  
 endeared to the thousands of the humbler classes,  
 to whom his name as an employer of labour will  
 ever be remembered as a benefactor.
