

board considered that the guardians should either require him to resign or appoint a substitute until he was convalescent. The board next noticed the illness of Relieving Officer Hickey, whose substitute, his son, did not attend regularly to have his books checked, and they wished to know if the latter has acted continuously since the 9th March. They next pointed out that the relieving officers did not furnish monthly reports as required by the regulations, respecting the orphan and deserted children in their districts, which should be insisted on. Mr Burke next referred to the crowded state of the male and female infirmaries in winter time, when the patients were accommodated in the fever hospital. He considered this objectionable arrangement would be obviated by utilising the chronic wards recently established for infirm patients, and he suggested that the guardians should consult their medical officer with a view to making, if possible, arrangements by which the fever hospital could be kept exclusively for the use of patients suffering from infectious diseases. Mr Bourke next made suggestions to secure the greater personal cleanliness of the inmates in the female aged and infirm wards, and then pointed out that there was a deficiency of blankets and rugs and also sheeting, although there was a sufficiency of material in stock. He considered the female lunatics should be taken out for exercise occasionally, and as the Protestant nurse acts as assistant lunatic attendant, there should be no difficulty experienced in carrying out this suggestion. With reference to the state of the Workhouse buildings, Mr Burke pointed out that the slating and ridge covering of the eave shoots and pipes and chimney shafts needed some slight repairs, and he expressed a wish that the painting of some of the wood-work of the house, suggested by him in his last report, should now be done. Stock of the provisions, clothing, etc. had not been taken since October last, and the Board desires to call attention to this matter. In concluding, the Board expressed a desire that the guardians should favourably consider Mr Burke's suggestion.

Chairman—Is it yearly stock is taken?
Clerk—It is sir.
Relieving Officer Smith—With reference to that portion referring to me, I attended regularly and had my accounts examined regularly, and within a month I examined the children in my district.
Clerk—There is no doubt, and he will admit it, that Mr Smith was for some time in delicate health, and he was not able to attend except on board days to have his accounts examined.
The Chairman then made an order that a committee be appointed to consider the Inspector's report, on this day fortnight, to meet at eleven o'clock, and to consist of Messrs James Cahill, Patk. Ryan, H. de L. Willis, J.P., J. W. Scott, J.P., J. Lynch, V.C. and the chairman, and that a special meeting of the board be summoned for the same date.
After signing cheques the Board adjourned.
