THE LATE JAY GOULD.

The singular sermon was preached about the 1st of Mr Jay Gould on Sunday evening by Dr Hitchens, of Ecclesten square Church, Belgrave road, London, from the text, "He had great possessions." The preacher, after showing that it does not bring great happiness or usefulness said—"To get some idea of the vastness of the possessions of the late Mr Gould let us take interesting calculations. Suppose his millions to be changed into £5 notes, and those joined together in one strip, it would run from London to Moscow. Suppose you change those notes into sovereigns, and one sovereign upon the other, they would form a column seventy-three miles high. Suppose the sovereigns were to be transferred from one to another, you would require an army of porters each to carry 112lb, or fifty-seven railway trucks. Suppose, again, those sovereigns changed into shillings, it would take you 240 years, working night and day, to give one shilling to each person, at the rate of one person each minute. You would have one shilling for every person in the wide world."

Perhaps the best description of Jay Gould, as the public judged him, was that given by the late Travers, commonly known as the "stammerer" of Wall-street. Travers was showing an English visitor the sights of New York City. As he passed down Wall-street he suddenly stopped his companion, and pointing to a man standing near the Custom House steps, exclaimed, "Do you know that little man over there; the one with the bl-bl-black beard? Take a go-good look; that's the gr-gr-great at cu-cu-curiosity in America—Jay Go-Gould, with his hands in his own pockets."

In the late years Mr Gould has been forced to employ a physician with him at all times, and when he went out to inspect his railway lines Dr Travers was his companion. Considering that he received a salary of £4,000 a year from Gould, and came in for lots of charming trips by land and sea, he could well afford to give his rich patient his attention.

Another companion of the great Railway King in his early every trip was Captain Shaakford, an officer of the White Star Line of steamers, who left the service to command Gould's yacht, the Atlantic. Gould took such a fancy to the "sea dog" that he insisted on his company whenever travelling on terra-firma. One day when Mr M. Dephew asked Gould why he always travelled with a doctor and a sea captain. "One goes out of the water, the other out of the land," answered Gould.

Some stories of Jay Gould are coming in thick and fast. He was asked if he had ever done anyone a good turn. "No," he replied, "why should I; I never did me a good turn," and then he went on—"There is not a man or woman living who would do me a good turn to save my life." "I do not wonder at this," he said, in reply to a mild remonstrance, "for I have had to shove down the neck of every man I have met. I have made my fortune, and I am in doing so I have had to ruin thousands."
