

of the Chief of the Police, the hospital, and the apothecaries' shops, and them all. The large Alexander Hospital, standing empty, as it was undergoing disinfection, was also in danger of being ordered; but the rioters encountered a soldier, who had in the meanwhile been released. The cholera hospital, in which the patients, was completely destroyed. They were taken into the streets, milk was sent to drink and they were rubbed with iodine, assured that they had not got the cholera. After quiet was restored twelve patients could not be traced. When the patients had been removed from the hospital nurses severely beaten, the building was destroyed and was burned to the ground. The rioters and the director begged on their knees, and one of the surgeons was chased until he sought refuge in the belfry of St. Vladimir Church. It would have gone with him had not the priest with a crucifix in his hands interceded for him. At that moment a man in the white dress of a nurse and covered with lime suddenly appeared among the crowd and assured them he had escaped from a hospital where they were just going to bury him. Like the others, he sent up a yell and rushed into the neighbouring streets. In the meanwhile he had arrived for the protection of the rioters, the doctors' dwellings, and the apothecaries. Soldiers also met the rioters on their way to the Cathedral square. Here the police and rioters fought with stones. One soldier was killed on the head. The officer warned them that if they did not disperse he would give orders to fire, but as another shower of stones was hurled at him, ten soldiers were ordered to fire. One soldier was killed and several wounded, and then dispersed.

Austrian Minister of the Interior has prohibited the entry into Austria of Jewish refugees from Russia on sanitary grounds.

Death is announced of Cardinal Giuseppe Saverio Galea. His Eminence was born at Bormio in 1815, and was created a Cardinal in 1875.

Title of cavalry troop sergeant-major is abolished, and the rank will in future be termed sergeant-major. The pay of the new rank has been increased by sixpence per diem.

James Donohoe, Ballyphilip, near Glanmire, was brought to the Cork Infirmary on Tuesday night from a broken arm, and some scalp laceration, the result of being tossed by a bull on a farm.

Lord Primate and the Archbishop of Dublin have, at the instance of the Bishop of St. John's, Newfoundland, addressed an appeal to the Government of the Church of Ireland for funds to the relief of the sufferers by the late disaster.

Windsor on Tuesday, Charles Edward Alexander, who claims to be a son of the late King of Abyssinia, was ordered to find sureties for his future good behaviour or go to prison for six months in default for using violent threats against Robert Jacobs at Windsor Races.

Freeman's Journal says—An unsuccessful attempt was made on yesterday to serve a writ of Bankruptcy Court upon Mr William J. M. P., at Roche's Hotel, Glengarriff. Some £3,000 was awarded against Mr. O'Brien, and proceedings were ordered to be taken to satisfy this debt.
