THEATRE AT HONG-KONG.

Andrew, of the Western Daily News, has received a letter from Mr. T. J. Lipton, a London vision merchant, dated Hong-Kong, which he gives the following interesting *recount* with an old story:—"I went to a Chinese theatre with my secretary. There were several European visitors. The theatre was filled with less than 3,000 Chinese. On the stage the audience stand would build in a crowd on the street. The play was sent up to the gallery on which is considered the swell part. I saw the performance plainly, I saw a European policeman in the office. I said to the Chinese would like to get nearer the policeman heard me speak in your face. You are a Glasgow man. I asked him where he came from and he said his name is Samuel M'Lennan, No. 100. He left you about when he found out that his hair on his head stood. "this is a funny place to be." "Ex-No. 100" then took the stage, where there would be 100 Chinese all standing.
