Ballinavloe, had the largest lot in the fair (1,900 sheep), and sold the wethers at prices varying from 50s. to 36s. and the ewes at from 30s. to 33s. 6d. He expressed the opinion that the prices obtained by him and his brother did not represent the ordinary prices obtained at the fair, and that the prices of ewes were 4s, to 5s, under those of last year, and of wethers 2s less. On the other hand such an excellent authority as Mr. Gavin Low stated that wethers were not a shilling under last year's price. As he bought about 600 wethers at from 42s. to 48s. and about 200 at from 30s. to 35s., his opinion is deserving of weight. The general belief, however, is that prices are lower all round than last year. Rams, of which there was but a small supply, represented a fall of from £1 to 30s, on the previous period. The prices this year are consequently lower than those of last year, which again were lower than those of the previous year. To make matters worse. hay was high and the grass supply short during the past twelve months, so that whilst the cost of maintaining sheep has gone up the prices have steadily fallen. The outlook for the Galway farmer, as far as sheep is concerned, is not a pleasant one, to judge by the Ballinasloe Fair.
