SAD SUICIDE OF A LIVERPOOL DOCTOR.

AN AFFECTING LETIER.

Liverpool, Monday. A inquest was held in Liverpool to-day on the body of Dr Howard Arnold, aged 43, a nephew of the late Matthew Arnold. Deceased had an attack of influenza three months ago, and had since suffered from insomnia, and became very depressed. He went to his surgery on Saturday and was followed by his wife, who found on a table a letter addressed to her, dated Saturday, us follows:-"My darling, how I love you. In my despair after these three months of insomnia and terrible depression, I feel death is preferable to insanity. Ask Robert to look after Aleyne. He will, I know. It is better for yout that I go now than to remain a drag on you. How happy life has been with you! And what an angel you have been to me. Yet this curse has killed me. My ast thought is of you, my darling. Forgive me, sweetheart, forgive me. It is for the best, dear love.—Howard." Arnold was found on a couch n another room, and he died in a few minutes. Two bottles were found near, which had cantained prussic acid, and a letter addressed to a fellow practitioner, asking him to do the best for his children. A verdict of suicide whilst in a state of temporary mental derangement was returned.

THE FAILURE OF THE LAND PURCHASE ACT.

To-day's Times says—The apparent failure of the Land Act of last year to attract either buyers or sellers in any considerable numbers and oubtedly tells against the Unionist cause. The measure was carried through Parliament at a heavy cost in time and labour. It was looked upon with no favourable eye by a large body of Conservatives, and it furnished the Opposition with an abundant supply of taunts mostly founded on misrepresentation, but nevertheless capable of producing a certain effect upon the public mind. All this was reckoned with beforehand, and would have been of no importance if the act had, as was anticipated, resulted in a large and immediate extension of peasant ownerships in Ireland.
