Passing, dribbling, and long kicking the ball, and once the net was between his teeth it was futile to try by kicking or pulling to release the ball. After about a quarter of an hour's "play," which caused the spectators much amusement, the net on the ball was torn and sport was abandoned, "neither side having scored."
