The four prisoners arrested for complicity in the firing and wounding of Mr. Weldon Moloney, solicitor, on 1st June, were discharged from custody to-day by the Crown. On the application of Mr. J. Cullinan, Crown Solicitor, the five remaining prisoners were remanded for eight days on the deposition of Dr. James Moloney that the injured man was not fit to give evidence or undergo cross-examination for one month at least. An application for bail was refused by Mr. Jones, R.M. Mr. O. Cullinane, B.L., with Mr. Miniken, solicitor, appeared for prisoners.
