for him a host of friends, especially amongst the  
poorer classes in the district in which he lived,  
and who have good reason to regret his demise.  
Being naturally of a retiring disposition, he did  
not often sit on the magisterial bench. He felt  
more at home at the poor-law board, where he  
rendered valuable services to the ratepayers,  
whose interests were always safe in his hands.  
The funeral will take place on to-morrow (Satur-  
day). To his bereaved wife and family we ten-  
der our sincere sympathy in the irreparable loss  
they have sustained.
