Pigs (porkers) 53s to 55s per cwt.; sows (extreme), 50s per cwt.; current, 46s to 48s per cwt. At Falkish (August) tryst, which was held on Tuesday, only half a dozen lots of Irish exposed. Those met an indifferent trade, and were not all sold. At Edinburgh yesterday (Wednesday) 167 cattle were stanced, as com- pared with 212 last week, and consisted mostly of Irish stock. A fair trade, with a good clear- ance, was experienced for best classes at a shade less money.
