THE DOON MURDER.

The excitement in Doon and Pallas districts over the murder of young O'Connell has abated somewhat, but the police entertain the belief that further blood-spilling may result at the first opportunity. The eight prisoners are still in the County Jail awaiting further remand, and an active search is kept up for a number of parties yet on the run, the man, it is said, who stabbed O'Connell amongst the number. The process-server Kennedy's life is still in danger. His assailant, Ryan, was removed to the County Gaol, from Pallas police station yesterday. It is scarcely probable the prisoners will be tried at the end of the remand, but will be formally put back for a further term pending the end of the constabulary inquiries.
