### MISHAP ON THE YOUGHAL LINE.

The train leaving Cork yesterday at 2.40 p.m. for Youghal, met with a mishap as it approached Youghal. It appears that all went well until it had reached within a quarter of a mile of Youghal, when one of the tubes of the engine burst, and the train was stopped. There was a gradient, however, at this point of the line into Youghal, and the train was enabled to proceed to the latter place down it, the hand brakes being applied. The railway authorities at Cork were communicated with, and another engine was sent on. The result of the mishap was that the train from Youghal, which was to have reached the city at five o'clock did not arrive until a quarter to seven.
