DEATH OF THE LORD BISHOP OF KILLALOE.

THE SHANNON DISTASTER.

The performance of the splendid band of the Royal Irish Constabulary on the Lansdowne grounds last evening attracted an extraordinary large attendance. For half an hour before the programme was begun people were streaming towards the grounds, and even at a quarter past eight there were at least a couple of hundred in the roadway waiting for admission.

DEATH OF MRS J. E. NOLAN. We regret to record the death of Mrs Nolan, wife of Dr. J. R. Nolan, Resident Medical Officer of the Limerick Workhouse. The deceased lady, who was a daughter of Mrs. Enright of the Shannon Hotel, Castleconnell, had been in a delicate state of health for some time.

THE LATE CAPTAIN FRANK R. PRESTON NAGADAM. The United Service Gazette has the following reference to the late Captain Frank Robert Preston MacAdam, son of Colonel MacAdam, J.P., Ballinacorney: "With reference to the recent fatal accident at York, which took place on the 21st inst., the Board of Ordnance has been advised by the late Captain Preston, who was a promising and accomplished young officer whose untimely end is universally lamented, to give the following particulars.

OPENING OF A RELIEF FUND IN GLIN. On Saturday evening a large and highly representative meeting was held in the Coffee Room of the Glin Arms Hotel, for the purpose of starting a relief fund, in aid of the relatives of the victims of the recent boating fatality on the Shannon.

THE SHANNON DISTASTER. Major Kiggell was moved to the chair, and in addressing the meeting spoke of the destitute position in which most of the families were placed, and appealed to the people of Glin and district to exert themselves in supporting this most charitable object.

DESPERATE OCCURRENCE IN CO. LIMERICK. STABBED TO DEATH AT A FOOTBALL MATCH. On Sunday last a tragic affair took place at a place called Cooga, near Doon, Co. Limerick, during the progress of a Gaelic Football Tournament, resulting in the death of a young man named John Connell, son of a respectable farmer residing at Castlegarden, convenient to the village of Newpallas.

EIGHT ARRESTS. On Monday last a party of five men, who were acting in the capacity of captain of the Oola team, were arrested on the 21st inst. in connection with the fatal accident at Cooga, the place selected, and the game was commenced about half-past three, both teams entering the contest apparently in the utmost good humour.

THE QUEEN'S JOURNEY TO SCOTLAND. The train-bearing the Queen and the Earl northwards reached Perth at 9.44 this morning. During a stay of fifty-five minutes it breakfasted at the Station Hotel.

TERRIBLE CYCLONE IN THE ILLINOIS STATES. Serious loss of life and enormous damage to property in the Illinois States. Thirty persons are reported as a cyclone which devastated Savannah. The damage to property is estimated at millions of dollars.

THE GERMAN'S IN EAST AFRICA. CAPTURE OF A FORTIFIED POSITION. A telegram from Dar-es-Salaam, East Africa, states that the fort St. Stan Meli, near Kilimengoro, was on the 12th inst. after some fighting it fell into the hands of the British.

DROWNING FATALITY. Three men named Pridg, Towke and Hodges were drowned off Guernsey in the capsizing of a punt. A Rothesay lad named Alexander fell from the training ship Empress to-day and was drowned.
