### DEATH OF SIR AUGUSTINE FITZGERALD.

We deeply regret to record the death of Sir  
Augustine Fitzgerald, Bart, which took place on  
Tuesday last at his residence, Carrigoran, New-  
market-on-Fergus. Sir Augustine was seized  
with an attack of paralysis in Dublin about six  
weeks ago, while on his way with Lady Fitzgerald  
to the Riviera, the effects of which caused his  
death. Deceased had reached the venerable age  
of 84 years, having been born in 1809, was son  
of the late Sir William Fitzgerald, and succeeded  
his brother, Sir Edward Fitzgerald, on his death  
in March 1865. He occupied the position of  
Lieutenant-Colonel in the Bengal Artillery, but  
left the service on coming into possession of the  
property. As an extensive landlord he was held  
in the highest esteem by his tenantry. He was  
twice married but leaves no issue. In 1871 he  
was High Sheriff of Clare. Some years ago a son  
and daughter met their deaths under melancholy  
circumstances in two successive years. His son  
was drowned in Carrigoran lake through the  
upsetting of a boat, and in the following year  
Miss Fitzgerald lost her life by being swept off  
the rocks at Spanish Point. The funeral takes  
place to-morrow.

### MELANCHOLY DROWNING ACCIDENT IN LIMERICK.

Yesterday afternoon a young gentleman named  
John Ryan, nephew to Mr John Ryan, Solicitor,  
Limerick, met his death under circumstances of  
the most melancholy character. Mr Ryan had  
attended the funeral of the late Mr Nash, J.P.  
and on his way home about half-past one o’clock  
with a pony and trap he turned into the slip  
near the Distillery to water the animal. The

current. The young gentleman, conscious of his  
position, endeavoured to jump off, but it appears

got entangled in his legs. The trap got  
overturned, and for some time Mr Ryan was lost  
sight of, the horse and trap being swept along  
towards Curragower Falls. Mr Ryan was ob-  
served to come to the surface, being swept along  
by the current towards the falls, and was hold-
