**SERIOUS ASSAULT.**—At the Police Court yesterday morning, before Mr G. W. Bassett, informations were granted against a man named Bryan O'Loughlan, who was charged with having fractured his wife's skull on Saturday night last. The woman, as alleged, received the injuries by being struck with an iron bar in the course of a quarrel. She is at present confined in Barrington's Hospital.

**A MILITARY STOWAWAY.**—On Sunday Sergeant Flynn, of the Dock Police Station, inspected the full-rigged ship, Henry Villiard, as she was leaving port for New York.
