### ARTIZANS' DWELLINGS IN LIMERICK.

At the meeting of the Corporation yesterday a deputation from the Congregated Trades attended to ask that the artizans dwellings scheme should be further extended in the city, as great necessity exists for proper houses for the working and artizan classes. The Mayor pointed out that the Corporation had selected the site, and an agreement had been made with the owners for the acquisition of the ground. Town Councillor M'Mahon objected to the Corporation expending £1,100 on ground which he considered unsuited for the purpose. Alderman Dundon thought that Mr M'Mahon should not force his individual opinion against the other 39 members of the council who were in favour of it. Mr M'Mahon urged that more convenient ground could be acquired at a less cost. After considerable discussion it was agreed that the scheme should be proceeded with, and that application for a loan of £1,100 should be made to the Board of Works, who had already given their sanction to a grant of £1,100 in connection with the building of artizans dwellings in the city, but the Act under which that was granted having expired, a further application is necessary.

The following very appreciative notice appears in the current number of the *Athenaeum*:—"Juanita" is a capital story of varied adventure, alternating between Malbay on the west of Ireland, Spain during a Carlist outbreak, and the island of Ustica, hard by Sicily. The reader will have to put up with a Jesuit priest, who commits virtual murders, and is explained away on the ground of madness; but he will be compensated by some well-drawn and entertaining characters, whose good and bad fortunes are invested with plenty of interest. The heroine is a hybrid rose, who has thriven on her mixture of Irish and Spanish sap, and the story of her life is full of pathos. Her cousin Gerald Gerald Morony and a Dutch skipper Van Buren—a smuggler by caprice, but an honest trader and philanthropist in the main—are amongst the half-dozen other personages in whom sympathy will be enlisted. Mr Fogerty seems to have caught some of the tricks of Mr Baring Gould's style. His characters are wont to speak in discursive and expanded sentences, varying between the manner of a guide-book and that of a book of epigrams; but his loose-jointed paragraphs are perfectly clear and graphic. The incidents connected with Juanita's slight defection are not original in their devising, but they are skilfully worked into a well-constructed plot."

### THE STABBING AFFRAY AT A FOOTBALL MATCH.

#### FURTHER PROCEEDINGS IN LIMERICK.

Another inquiry was held in Limerick to-day before Colonel Tynte, R M, at which John Kennedy was charged by District Inspector McGhee, Newpallas, with fatally stabbing John Connell, while engaged in a football match near Doon, on Sunday, 24th August. Kennedy has been wanted by the police since the occurrence and on Tuesday night was arrested by Sergeant McKeon in a friends house near Hospital. Yesterday he was formally remanded pending to-day's investigation. At the previous inquiry held in Limerick, statements were made by witnesses connecting Kennedy with the occurrence, and these were to-day adduced as evidence against him, the eight other young men in custody being also present at the reading of the depositions. Further evidence being given to-day, the accused were all remanded, the Crown not objecting to an application from Mr Barry, solr, Tipperary, to admit William Anderson, Thos Ryan, John Moloney, and Patk Hayes to bail in £100 and two 250 sureties. Mr T H Kenny, solr, appeared for Kennedy. To-day's inquiry, as these hitherto, was private.
