

THE LATE BISHOP OF KILLAEOE.

The remains of the Bishop of Killaloe were removed yesterday evening from Dublin to Enniscorthy, where the interment took place. Previous to their removal a special service was held in St Patrick's Cathedral, at which the Archbishop of Dublin, the Dean of the Chapel Royal, and Rev T S Winder officiated. The Archbishop delivered an appropriate address.

THE FUNERAL—THIS DAY.

Parsonstown, Thursday.

The remains of the late Right Rev Dr Chester, Bishop of Killaloe, arrived here from Dublin last night. There was a large attendance at the station, and the remains were removed to the Parish Church, the chancel of which was draped in black. Amongst the representatives of the diocese at the funeral were the Very Rev John Humphreys, Rev A H Stanistreet, Chaplain to the late Bishop; Rev E O'Mally, Clonlara, and Rev T Taylor, Castleconnell. All the shops were closed this morning, and every mark of sorrow and respect was visible. A dense concourse assembled in and around the church at noon, when the Burial Service began, the organ voluntary preceding the 300th Hymn. The Ven Archdeacon Jones, Roscrea, read the first portion of the Service, after which the choir sang the 39th and 90th Psalms. Rev Professor McPhillip preached a very touching discourse, and at the conclusion the beautiful Hymn, "For ever with the Lord," was sung. As the coffin was being borne from the Church, the clergy, wearing their surplices, accompanied it. On the way to the cemetery the cortege was very large, there being a long line of vehicles and representatives of every class and creed. At the grave the final portion of the Service was read by the Dean of Killaloe and Canon Humphreys. The Very Rev John Bugler, P P, Parsonstown, was amongst those who attended the funeral, at which, as everybody stated, all classes and creeds were present. About one hundred of the deceased late Bishop's clergy were present.

DIOCESE OF TUAM.

The Synod of Tuam was held on Tuesday—the Bishop of the diocese presiding. His Lordship delivered an interesting address, in the course of which he made sympathetic reference to the death of the Bishop of Killaloe, and extended sympathy to the members to the widow and family of the late lamented prelate.

FUNERAL OF THE LATE MRS. J. R. NOLAN.

SEQUEL TO THE TRAGEDY AT A FOOTBALL MATCH.

AN OLD MAN SERIOUSLY INJURED. (FROM OUR REPORTER).

A serious occurrence, which supplies a sequel to Sunday's tragedy at a football match near Doon, when a fine young fellow named Connell was beaten and stabbed to death, took place near Doon on Tuesday evening. The victim of this outrage is an old man named Mathew Kennedy, residing at Doon, who acts in the capacity of bailiff and process server, and whose son, it appears, is being sought for by the police in connection with the assault which resulted in poor Connell's death. Kennedy was at Newpallas Petty Sessions on Tuesday, and when proceeding home in the evening in a cart he met a man named William Ryan at Castlegarde, near where the Connell family live. Ryan, who it would appear, is a near relative of Connell's, saluted Kennedy in familiar and friendly terms, and asked him for a drive. To this Kennedy readily consented, but Ryan, as alleged, had only mounted the cart when he attacked the old man, and it is stated attempted to choke him, saying "I will give you now what your son gave my cousin." Kennedy was thrown off his cart and kicked about the face and head, receiving several bad cuts and a fracture of the head. Eventually he managed to release himself from Ryan, and sought protection in a neighbouring house, but before entering Ryan, who followed him, succeeded in dealing him another stroke with his foot. After considerable delay, Kennedy resumed his journey, but he had not proceeded far when he noticed his assailant and two other men on the road before him, evidently waiting to renew the attack. He drove back as fast as he could, being hotly pursued by the men, but succeeded in reaching the place of protection before they could reach him. The injured man was promptly attended by Dr Fitzgerald, who dressed his wounds. News of the occurrence soon spread, a rumour getting afloat that another murder had been committed, but this, happily, was without foundation. The police visited the scene of the affair soon afterwards. At six o'clock yesterday morning, Colonel De Burgh attended at the injured man's residence, and took his depositions in presence of Ryan, who had been arrested by Sergeant Conway, of Doon station. Kennedy identified Ryan as the person who had inflicted his injuries, and made a deposition which bears out the facts as stated. The accused was remanded for eight days without bail. He is about fifty years of age, and a well-to-do farmer. In consequence of Sunday's tragedy District-Inspector M'Ghee, Newpallas, returned from leave of absence yesterday, and the police in the surrounding districts are actively engaged in pursuing inquiries. Further important arrests in connection with the killing of Connell are expected. The melancholy affair has thrown the district into a state of intense excitement.
