of the death of Mr James Haran, of the Limerick Branch of the bank, which took place on Sunday afternoon, and which caused the utmost sorrow throughout the city, and the painful suddenness intensifying the grief was everywhere manifest. On Sunday afternoon Mr Haran rose for his usual robust walk in the direction of Patrick's Wall, but he was overcome by the oppressive heat that prevailed, and he fell, although he did not receive any serious injury. After dinner, and while he was sitting in one of his children reclining, with a paternal regard, Mr Haran was taken ill, and he became insensible. He was removed to his room, and medical aid was immediately sent for. Dr Barry soon arrived, and he was attended by Drs Gelston and Malone, but no medical skill could suggest, but without avail, the deceased was expiring after a momentary respite, which was due to suffusion of the brain. The deceased was held in high regard in official circles, and his efforts to promote the business of the bank were highly appreciated by the directors, and he was a courteous and gentlemanly man, and his death was a great affliction to his wife and to all who were acquainted with him. His share of the sympathy which is uniformly shown to them in their grief. Mr Haran's connection with the bank extended over thirty years, and his experience being, we believe, in no other branch of the bank was afterwards transferred to him, and he was promoted to the position of manager, and in the year 1876 he was promoted to the management of the bank. His sterling business capabilities gained for him distinction, and in 1878 he was returned to Limerick as manager of the branch here. Deceased was a member of the County Club and of the County Club and Commerce, but he never took any active part in either. Numerous letters of condolence have been received by the gentleman's bereaved wife. The funeral will be removed to St Michael's Church, and Requiem Mass will be celebrated on Monday morning at 10 o'clock, after which the general will leave for Mount St. Mary's.

THE FATAL AFFRAY AT A  
FOOTBALL MATCH.

PRIVATE INVESTIGATION IN LIMERICK.

A private investigation was held at the County Courthouse to-day in connection with the fatal stabbing of a young man named John Connell, at a football match, at Cooga, Doon, on the 27th August, and for which eight young men have been arrested, namely—Robert Woods, John Moloney, Patrick Hayes, Edward Russell, Wm. Tobin, Wm. Anderson, Denis Anderson, and another. The accused were charged with having unlawfully, and of malice aforethought, killed John Connell.

District-Inspector McGhee, Newpallas, conducted the case, and the accused were represented by Mr Edmund Barry, solicitor, Tipperary.

The proceedings were private, nobody but the prisoners and the police and some witnesses being allowed into court, the members of the press being excluded in common with the general public.

Constable Donnellan, stationed at a hut in Newpallas district, deposed to being at the football match in plain clothes, the opposing teams being Gurtavilla and Oola. Fifteen minutes play had only gone on when something occurred; he saw John Connell (the deceased) facing the crowd, and he saw William Tobin (one of the accused) strike him; the crowd appeared to be hostile to Connell; witness lost sight of him, and saw the prisoner John Moloney strike at several people in the crowd.

Mr Barry cross-examined the witness, who stated the row was going on about five minutes; he didn't see any knife used, but knew it was from a wound by a knife that Connell died.

Michael O'Donoghue, Clogher, deposed to seeing Denis Anderson (another of the prisoners) in the row which Connell commenced.

James Connell, brother of the deceased, stated that after the Gurtavilla team had scored, the Oola people "wheeled" "Here's for Oola"; Anderson and his brother got into a conflict, his brother striking Anderson first; the Oola people then "wheeled" "Hold Connell, of Castle-gardo."

In reply to Mr Barry, the witness admitted it was his brother who commenced the row; none of the blows he got then hurt him; witness then left that part of the field, and about twenty minutes after heard of his brother being fatally wounded.

Constable McEvoy having given formal evidence,

District-Inspector McGhee applied for the further remand of the accused till Monday in Limerick.

Mr Barry addressed the Court at length on the nature of the evidence which in no way implicated the accused in the fatality, and urged that they be admitted to bail.

Mr McGhee opposed the application, and Colonel Tynte remanded the accused in custody till Monday, it being understood that the Crown case would close on that day, and on the following day the accused would be taken to Newpallas.
