long distances at enormous expense to dispose of
their horses. To enable horse buyers to attend
from all parts, the West Clare Railway ran special
trains to Kilrush on Sunday, the Lower Shannon
Steamship Company running a steamer from
Limerick and Foynes to this town. The supply
of all descriptions of horses was very large, there
being considerably over 1,000 exhibited, most of
them suitable for cavalry purposes. The leading
buyers stated they never saw a new horse fair
better patronised, nor a town, owing to its wide
streets, better suited for a horse fair than Kilrush.
The buyers in attendance were from Dublin,
Waterford, Cork, Limerick, Belfast, and other
large centres, as well as local men. Owing to the
near approach of some old established
fairs in other places the sellers were
considered rather stiff in their demands,
and this coupled with the fact of the great
drought in England and other countries, accounted
for the fact that the number of sales effected
was not as large as would otherwise have been the
case. It was also known that a "lull" prevails
with foreign governments for cavalry horses, but
still a great many sales were effected at £70, and
some nice lots from £35 to £50, and £60. The
Town Commissioners have made excellent arrange-
ments for the fair, whilst the buyers were
afforded the utmost facility by the townspeople,
as well as moderate charges at the hotels and
other establishments. There was some splendid
jumping at the fair grounds. The Town Com-
missioners deserve the utmost praise for the
success of the first horse fair here.
