## THE SHANNON BOATING DISASTER.

ANOTHER BODY FOUND. (FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.) Tarbert, Saturday.

On yeste day the body of Thomas Glazer was washed ashore at Rallagrane, two miles west of Tarbert lighthouse and quite close to the place where the ill-fated boat was last seen. 'The body was very much disfigured, and was only recognised by the clothes. There are still seven bodies missing, of which the following is a list:— Mary Scanlan, Bridget Scanlan, Hannah Sullivan, Johanna McGrath, Mary Lyndon, Patrick Murphy, Michael Scanlan. Only two of the seven women were found.
