hire, have agreed to continue work at the old rates. Coal advanced a shilling a ton at Glasgow yesterday. The masters will probably offer the men an advance of 6d per day.

At the opening of the London Coal Exchange yesterday, there was only a small attendance of members. The market was firm at—best Wallsend 25s, and Silkstone 23s per ton. As the afternoon wore on, however, there was a full attendance, with the result that at the close an advance beyond that of Friday last was announced of 2s per ton on best Wallsend, as between colliery agent and merchant; 1s on all coal to be sold to the public, and 1s increase to dealers. These figures naturally caused no little excitement, but so far as could be ascertained very little business was done at the prices. A private meeting of the principal merchants on the Exchange was held in the afternoon in the rooms of the Society of Coal Merchants. It was subsequently announced that in view of the colliery owners' and agents' increase to the merchants the latter had been compelled to increase the price of coal to the public a further shilling per ton, and to dealers a similar amount, making a total rise of four thillings per ton since the commencement of the crisis. The representatives of the Amalgamated National Union of Coalporters and Amalgamated Society of Watermen and Lightermen were in attendance at the Exchange throughout the afternoon. Despite the fact that a large number of agents on the Exchange have received an intimation that the collieries they represent are at a standstill, they continue to accept orders at the current market prices, and this is regarded as an intimation that they have plenty of coal at the pit's mouth.
