Meehan, parish priest of the United Parishes of Aghnacoon and Ettagh, in North Tipperary. Father Meehan was a native of Ardsollus, and had been forty years in the ministry, which was mostly spent in the Diocese of Killaloe. The deceased gentleman was respected by all classes and creeds. Avoiding interference with political questions, he devoted all his energies to parochial work. The deceased was brother of the late Mr Thomas O'Meehan, Ennis, and also of Mrs Harris, wife of Mr James Harris, Limerick.
