THE ELCHO SHIELD.

FRANCISCO TO QUEENSTOWN.
 An ocean race from San Francisco has been won by the ship Pinmore (Captain Maxwell), which arrived at Queenstown this evening after a 24 days' passage. She secured first prize of £100. Nothing has been heard of her competitors, Lord Templemore, Bowden and others. The first three named sailed the 1st of July, and the Athens a day later. The ship will save her sweepstake of £50. The crew saw nothing of the other vessels during the race.

MR MICHAEL DAVITT.

London correspondent of the Nottingham Daily Telegraph declares that he has authority for denying the statement recently attributed to Mr Michael Davitt that he has resolved never to enter Parliament again. The application by Mr Davitt for a certificate is to come on in a few days at the Court but unfortunately Judge Boyd, who is to hear the case, is away on his vacation, and it is expected that Judge Miller, who will occupy his place, will adjourn it for his colleague's consideration. If Mr Davitt had been successful in his application, strong pressure (adds the correspondent) would be brought to bear on him to himself to be nominated for the vacancy by the resignation of Mr Deasy.

THE VICTORIA DISASTER FUND.

The fund now amounts to close on £50,000, and communications have been entered into with the Admiralty as to the final distribution of the fund. The Admiralty have suggested that a new commission should be created, consisting partly of the Commissioners of the Patriotic Fund and partly of the managing body of the Royal Naval Exhibition, and their proposal is now under the consideration of the Patriotic Fund.

THE SILVER QUESTION.

NEW DEVELOPMENTS.

So bitter is the feeling against the suspension of silver coinage that a secret organisation has come into existence in the Rocky Mountains called the Knights of the Silver Circle. The Knights threaten, in case the Sherman law is repealed, to compel Colorado to leave the American Union and unite with the Republic of Mexico, which is a silver coinage country. The Western States are honeycombed with secret societies, who are deliberating on the question of secession. Many of these societies are armed and organised, and, it is said, in the habit of holding monthly meetings for the purpose of drill. Arms and ammunition, it is hinted, have been collected in out of the way spots, and the members have secret signs and passwords to recognise one another in public.
