### SHIPPING CASUALTY.

Dundee barque Glenalton, 1,100 tons, Kilgour, arrived for orders at Queens-Thursday from Tanco, Chili, with wheat, countering a terrific hurricane, during the vessel suffered considerably, and three of the crew were injured. When off Kildare Islands the hurricane burst on the wind blowing with terrific violence N.W., and raged with fury for three hours without cessation. The topsails were blown down, and huge seas leaped on board, the docks and washing everything overboard. Captain Kilgour, the cook, and crew were knocked down, and received in. The lifeboats were wrecked to pieces, engine-room was flooded.

### WRECKS IN 1892.

Wreck Register and Chart for year ended 1892," just issued by the Board of Trade, shows an increase of 512 in the shipping casualties on our coast, the total having risen from 1891 to 4,710 in the present return. Of these casualties 4,200 befell British and Colonial steamers, and 501 foreign vessels, the showing an increase of 515, and the latter of three as compared with preceding years. There is also shown an increase of 42 in the number of lives lost, which has risen from 523 in 1891 to 565 in 1892. Of the lives lost 472 were from British steamers, and 93 from foreign ships, a total of 565, as regards the first, and an increase in respect of the second class of vessels. In one-third of the casualties were cases of loss of life, the total being 1,630, or 108 more than the previous year; and the cases of total loss of life at 997 show an increase of 139.

Faversham. The deceased nobleman was a man of simple taste, preferring the quiet routine of a country gentleman's life to the more exciting pursuits of fashion and pleasure. Agricultural horticulture occupied much of his attention. He held the position of President of the Horticultural Society for many years. He was a member of the Royal Dublin Society since 1869, he did not take a very active part in its work, but for some time he held office as one of the trustees of the National Library of Ireland. In the Mayo district, where he resided during the greater part of the year, the Duke was on the most friendly terms with all his neighbours, and his genial, sociable, unaffected manner won for him universal esteem. His death at an early age, and so totally unexpected, is a painful shock to a wide circle outside that of the family. The late Duke was a Privy Councillor, and ranked as premier Duke, Marquis, and Earl of Ireland. In his native county, Kildare, he was a Deputy Lieutenant and Justice of the Peace. He took an earnest part in the deliberations of the Synod of the diocese in which he resided, and his quiet, thoughtful utterances always commanded the attention of the house. In the years 1874-5 he held the post of Captain of the Kildare Militia. He is succeeded in title and estates by his eldest son, Maurice (heretofore Marquis of Kildare), born in March, 1887. His second son, Lord Desmond, was born in 1888. Besides Carton House, the Leinster family have a residence at Kilkea Castle, Mageny, County Kildare.
