ACCIDENT TO A HOLIDAY PARTY.

Ilfracombe, Friday.

A coach laden with holiday-makers was overturned near Ilfracombe to-day, and some of the passengers were injured. It appears that the horses attached to the coach became frightened on reaching Directions Hill, between Lynton and Lymouth, and the driver lost control of them, with the result that the vehicle was overturned. The Misses Waugh, sisters, who with two friends left Ilfracombe on the coach, seem to have fared the worst. They were pitched into the valley, and one of them is now lying at the Valley Rocks Hotel, and the other at the Cottage Hospital, seriously injured. There were seventeen passengers on the coach, and two of these, Mr Frank Jones, of Plumstead, and Mr George Knight, of London, appear to have escaped uninjured. The rector of Lynton and Doctors Hubbard and Hendley are doing their utmost for the sufferers. Dr Pearce, a visitor from London, is also in attendance on the injured.

HORRIBLE OCCURRENCE IN DUBLIN.

THREE PERSONS DROWNED.

Late last night a highland soldier and an unfortunate were seen quarrelling by Eden Quay, Dublin, both being in drink. Persons in the vicinity soon afterwards noticed the woman struggling in the water, and saw the soldier plunge in to endeavour to save her. Both, however, were drowned, together with Christopher Trefell, second engineer of the steamer "Nornby," a native of Boodle, who tried to rescue the parties, and two other men named Orson and Doyle, narrowly escaped the same fate.
