much has been done both by assistance and by private effort for the advantage of Ireland, the effects of which are now beginning to show themselves, and in Ireland were looking to the future, and we believe, with well-founded confidence, in which party feeling and barren discussion were rapidly calming down." Mr. Stowe comes forward with his ill-considered "plunge" Ireland again into a general and party ferment which cannot be of any service or enterprise in every direction. He continues the address, "in the bill nothing but the perpetuation and increase of the unsettlement which has so long been a source of shame and sorrow to all true Irishmen; and we earnestly trust, not only for the sake of Ireland, but for the sake also of the Kingdom of which Ireland still forms a great part, and of the Empire in which we are attached subjects of our gracious Sovereign, to have their birthright, that is, the bill, allowed to pass into law." The bill of the Great Northern Railway pointed out by the last few weeks the capital of the country was depreciated to the extent of £10,000,000 of money already. Alderman Sir John and coal merchant, and steamship owner, Cork, implored the British people to support the industrial revival in Ireland by a measure which meant nothing to the industries of the country. Mr. Joseph Hone, Governor of the Bank of Ireland, and Mr. Maurice Dockrell, of Dublin, having briefly referred to the deputation, and that the people of England are becoming acquainted with the true position of Ireland. It is gradually, however, becoming apparent that Mr. Gladstone has passed a death sentence upon the island. Lord Salisbury advised the English people, not only personally, and he did not doubt they would resist the passing of an unwise measure. Mr. Balfour and Lord Randolph spoke, the latter referring warmly to Mr. Gladstone's refusal to receive the deputation.

SUDDEN DEATH.

An awfully sudden death occurred in George-street yesterday afternoon, about 1 o'clock. A man named Michael Ryan while walking down the street was noticed to fall, apparently in a fainting condition. A lady who was passing at the time directed the attention of Constable Mallon, who was on duty in the street, to the occurrence. The constable immediately went to the man's aid, and rendered all the assistance in his power, but the poor man expired in a few minutes. Dr. Shanahan, on his arrival shortly afterwards, pronouncing life to be extinct. An inquest was held on the body yesterday evening by Mr. Coroner DeCourcy and a jury. The medical evidence showed that death resulted from heart disease, and a verdict was returned accordingly. The deceased, who was about 60 years of age, appeared to have enjoyed good health, and much sympathy is felt for his family in the bereavement which has so suddenly befallen them.
