The debate was barely opened on Friday evening ast, and between this and the fated hour or Thersday night Parliament must make up its mind on one of the most vital points of the Bill. The efficiency, if not the very existence, of the Imperial Parliament is at stake, and Mr Gladstone considers a few days' discus-sion will be sufficient for the re-construction of a Constitution and method of Government of a Constitution and method of Government which have been the slow growth of centuries. To a certain extent the nation takes little interest at present in the Parliamentary debates, for it is well known the House of Lorda will reject the Bill, and that, on an appeal to the electorate, the rejection will be maintained by an overwhelming majority.
