at Moyriska, Quin, on Tuesday last.
Wm B Fitt, auctioneer, held a clearance
of cattle, sheep and horses, &c, at Moyriska,

from 5d to 7s 6d. Last night he marked some
money with a figure of "6," and this morning
came into the office at an early hour and secreted
himself under a desk. The prisoner came in
between eight and nine, and it is alleged that he
took out of his pocket a key of the safe, and hav-
ing opened it, took out a wooden box and
abstracted 5s of the marked money. Mr Cronin
jumped up and charged him with the offence,
and communicated with Sergeant Cully who
found some of the marked coin in
his possession. The key of the
safe could not be discovered, but after
a diligent search Constable Reidy found it under
a press in the office. The prisoner was taken
before Mr J B Irwin, R M, who remanded him to
petty sessions.

CHARGE OF HOMICIDE IN COUNTY LIMERICK.

At a special court of petty sessions held at
Newcastlewest on Thursday, before Major Rolles-
ton, R M, a young man named Edward Broughton,
of the labouring class, and residing at Drom-
collogher, was charged at the prosecution of
District Inspector Wright, with having murdered
a young man named James Barry on the 18th
October last.

Mr John Condon, solicitor, appeared for the
accused.

The occurrence took place so far back as the
13th of October, at Dromcollogher fair, the
prisoner, it is alleged, striking Barry on the head
with a stick, from the effects of which, it is
stated, he died in Newcastle workhouse hospital
on the 10th inst.

John Collins deposed to seeing the prisoner
and the deceased fighting in Dromcollogher, and
saw the prisoner striking him with a stick on the
side of the head from which the blood flowed.

John Dooly corroborated the evidence of the
last witness, adding he was endeavouring to take
away the deceased, when he (Barry) staggered
against the arch and declared he would be able
to fight Broughton drunk or sober.

Daniel Collins, manager of the dairy factory
at Dromcollogher, deposed to a previous row
between the parties.

Patrick Savage, junior, deposed that the
deceased was some four weeks in the employ-
ment of witness's father. On returning from
Charleville fair on the 14th November he com-
plained of a pain in his left side, and he was
subsequently removed to Newcastle West Infir-
mary.

Dr Pierce deposed that Barry was admitted to
the Workhouse Hospital on the 21st Nov, com-
plaining of a wound on the left side of the head
and partial paralysis of the left side. Inflama-
tion of the brain developed, and the ailment was
complicated by influenza. The deceased died
on the 10th inst, but in all probability would
have lived had he come to hospital at a proper
time. The attack of influenza hastened his
death.

Mr Condon reserved his defence, but urged
the charge, at most, should have been man-
slaughter.

Major Rolleston held the evidence disclosed
a prima facie case, and the accused was returned
for trial on the capital charge to the Spring
Assizes.
