which was the case in every such case within my observation, and they were a great many. It would well pay many farmers to sink a well 10 or 12 feet deep, and put down a pump instead of continuing to use for dairy purposes the water of the surface well to which they have been accustomed, no matter how good and clear or how abundant the supply from it may be. A very strong spring issuing from the foot of a tolerably high hill will give water as cold as if it came from a deep well. This, though apparently an exception, can be easily accounted for, and is in reality a confirmation of the rule.
